DONATIONS POLICY.

From time to time the Parish Council is asked to provide funding to a variety of local groups in pursuit of their specific aims. We prepare a budget every October which takes into account the likelihood of these requests, but sometimes not all the funding requests can be granted owing to lack of advance notice. Although the Parish Council cannot promise to provide any or all of the amounts requested, the council would like to make the funding policy more widely known and a brief outline is given below. The Parish Council will give priority to applications which address one or more of the following:

Create safer and stronger communities. Enable employment opportunities and access to employment.

Encourage and develop healthy and active lifestyles. Improve the quality and cleanliness of our environment.

Promote and develop decent and affordable housing. Improve sport and leisure provision usage.

Minimise waste and maximise recycling.

Additionally if a local voluntary group would like to apply for funding the council will expect them to provide: Estimated costs of the project or activity for which the donation is required. Latest accounts, where appropriate.

An explanation as to how the grant is to be spent. Access to the Parish Council to monitor the project or activities.

A report to the Parish Council on how the donation has been spent on conclusion.

More detailed information on the parish council's donations policy is available from the clerk. All requests for funding in 2010 should be lodged with the Parish Council by the end of September 2009; emergency requests may be considered at other times of the year.

Have a Safe & Secure Summer!

West Mercia is a safe place to live and burglary figures remain low. In fact, less than one per cent of homes are burgled each year and your local policing team is working hard to reduce this figure even further. Most burglaries are carried out by opportunistic thieves and up to half are committed by thieves who enter the house through an unlocked door or an open window. With the advent of hot weather, West Mercia Police is reminding residents to be vigilant and follow a few simple steps to significantly reduce the chances of their home being broken into

over the summer months and while away on holiday:

- Ensure doors and windows are locked at all times.
- Fit sturdy deadlocks (British Standard BS3621) to all external doors
- Use timer switches to turn lights on in the evenings while you are out
- Ensure newspapers, post, milk etc are not left on display
- Ask a friend or neighbour to keep an eye on your home while you're away.
- Don't forget your garden! Effective garden security includes defensive planting and

Why Play Bridge?

Bridge is a trick-taking card game of skill and chance. It is one of the most enduring games in the world; for over 100 years, people of all types and from all walks of life have been fascinated by the game. It is one of the most popular leisure activities in Britain, with around 300,000 people playing bridge on a regular basis. Bridge is an excellent social game, which can be played by everyone. It is an inexpensive activity, a wonderful way to meet new people, make new friends and take on new challenges! Men and women play bridge in almost equal numbers. Marginally more women than men attend bridge lessons and marginally more men than women take part in championship matches!

There are many opportunities in this area to learn how to play. Local colleges run bridge tuition courses for beginners and improving players. There are also local bridge teachers available who will arrange a course of lessons on a private basis. For those bridge players who want to be more adventurous, there are opportunities to play a gentler form of Duplicate Bridge. The aim of these sessions is to encourage new, inexperienced or 'non-duplicate' players to continue improving their game without the added stress of time constraints or playing with very experienced and practiced players. For the really adventurous there are many bridge clubs in the area who would be delighted to welcome new players. Visitors would receive a warm welcome and in many clubs individual players are always guaranteed a partner.
