Every Saturday morning over 100 boys and girls train, play football and just have fun in a safe environment. The coaches have FA level 1 or level 2 qualifications and are all volunteers. On Sundays you will find all the same children running around in hopefully a more organised fashion as they play their matches.

Their ages range from 5 to 15 years old and to be honest up to now it's been mainly boys, but I read somewhere that girls football is the fastest growing sport in the country and this is true at Catshill FC where girls are showing a real interest and increasing in numbers every week.

We also play matches on the Meadow and are very much a community club; we are very proud of the fact we represent Catshill.

# A Message from the Chair



**HELLO** Again.

Well, I guess it is Autumn and when walking my dog around the village I can see the evidence of the work carried out by our Lengthsman and Litter Picker, coupled with the efforts of Bromsgrove District Council and Worcestershire County Council.

The wildlife that is now visiting our balancing pools and the fields surrounding the Parish make for a pleasant stroll. There is a wide variety of birds to witness if you are vigilant.

We are all working towards making Catshill a good place to live and be brought up in.

To this end your Parish Council is sponsoring a Neighbourhood Planning Team that is rapidly developing into a comprehensive, knowledgeable unit which will shortly, with your assistance and input, produce a plan for our Parish together for the perusal of all prior to a Parish referendum. The Gardens that we upkeep are doing well with the possible exception of the one at the Baptist Church. We will work to ensure that this one also comes up to our established standard.

Concerns about traffic and parking are regular issues brought to our attention, a problem that is very difficult to address. However, for those of you that feel the need to park on the footpath please be aware that you must by law leave room for a wheel chair to pass without going onto the road. We will continue to work to achieve the best practical solution to these problems.

We have erected a new bus shelter at the top of Golden Cross Lane on the A38. It is with some disappointment that I notice the need some individuals have in scraping the paint off and generally defacing the other shelters recently erected in the Parish.

Your Council is very involved in the arrangements for the Armistice Day commemorations and also the Bonfire Night on the Village Meadow, followed by the Christmas Dinner for those that may not otherwise have one; this is to be held in the Village Hall.

We still have a vacancy on the council to make up our total complement of thirteen. If you feel you would like to get involved please contact our Clerk, Becky, who will convince you that you are making the correct decision.

You may wish to work in the sub committees of Finance and Staffing, Environment and Highways, or Planning. If you feel able to help, why not get involved?

I would like to express my gratitude to the District Councillors and County Councillor for their regular attendance and valued contributions to our Monthly Full Parish Council meetings.

**THE** Parish Council are, as you may be aware, involved in a rolling programme of maintenance, repair and replacement of bus shelters within Catshill and North Marlbrook. Following application for monies from the New Homes Bonus Grant 2015/16, the Council were successful in obtaining £3500 towards the purchase and installation of a new shelter. It was decided that the one situated outside the Miu Miu restaurant on the A38 was in dire need of attention and therefore on 4th and 5th August 2016 a new shelter was erected in this location. The photographs show the site



before and after the installation and we are pleased that this well used stop is now a far more pleasant space for people who are using the public transport system.

#### Parish Gardens in Catshill

**IT** has been a fairly dry summer this year, as a result of which I have spent a considerable length of time watering the bedding display in the Ivy Cottage Gardens, during July and August. This turned out to be a much more pleasant task than anticipated; there was a constant flow of members of the Parish passing by, pausing to admire the display and they all had time to stop and have a chat. They all told me how much they enjoyed the



gardens and appreciated the wonderful display. This is the third year that we have contracted the award winning Rednal Nursery, Birmingham parks Department, to plant the garden. The most recent awards include Gold at the Chelsea Flower Show in 2016, and Gold in the Britain in Bloom competition in 2014 and 2015.

Over the years, the Parish Council has had a policy of installing new gardens in strategic locations and carrying out extensive bulb planting and tree planting, throughout the Parish, to enhance the environment. In addition to the Ivy Cottage Gardens, the two gardens on the A38 - at the junction with Braces Lane and the one adjacent to the new cemetery - are now well established and providing a good display. The new garden on the corner by the Baptist Church, now in its first year, has been more problematic. Difficulties with watering, weed control and vandalism, has resulted in a very shabby appearance; however, we intend to address these problems and are confident that this garden will achieve its full potential within the next couple of years.

Well, summer is now over but we are already planning for next year!

# Flood Alleviation Balancing Ponds



SEVERAL editions of this newsletter over the vears have had features about the flooding problems in Catshill, especially the problems experienced in the Green Lane area. As a temporary measure the Parish Council funded a small hut to house sandbags that local residents could have easy access to in times of

flooding. However, more recently new balancing ponds have been constructed to the side of the Horse Course playing field, a little upstream from the flood areas. The good news is that according to local residents these balancing pools are working well and preventing flooding. This photograph was taken from the footpath that runs next to the ponds. Due to the ponds being fenced off, this area has become a mini wildlife area, and is most attractive. Let's hope that the sandbags are never needed again.





**AS** was reported in the previous edition of this newsletter, the Parish Council obtained saplings from the Woodland Trust Free Tree programme last year, which were planted near the new balancing ponds in Catshill.

Tree planting has continued this year; this time a small oak grown from an acorn that had dropped from a local tree, was planted near the balancing ponds. It will be interesting to track its progress over the coming months and years to see if this particular little acorn turns into a great oak.

## Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

**YOU** may remember that the Parish Council recently announced that it was looking for support from the local community to assist in the formulation of a Neighbourhood Plan. We are pleased to report that a number of local residents did come forward and have now joined a 'Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group', which also includes four members of the Parish Council.

At a recent meeting of the Steering Group Dr Chris Fabray was elected Chair and Paul Fisher Vice Chair. A small working group has now been established to identify opportunities for involving the wider community in the design of the Neighbourhood Plan and a possible timeline and Project Plan.

A Neighbourhood Plan is a community-led planning framework for guiding the future development, regeneration and conservation of an area. It will form part of the statutory development plan for the area and provide the opportunity for communities to set out a positive vision for how they want their community to develop.

Communities are able to choose where they want new homes, shops and offices to be built, have their say on what those new buildings should look like and what infrastructure should be provided, and grant planning permission for the new buildings they want to see go ahead.

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group will be meeting once a month. If you feel that you would like to get actively involved with the Steering Group please register your interest with the Parish Clerk'.

**IN** April this year, Catshill Baptist Church appointed a new Minister after having been without one for almost three years. Rev Simon Gudger, his wife Louise, their twin boys, Luke and Ben, and daughter Faith, made the short journey from Kidderminster Baptist Church where they had been since 2006.

"It wasn't that we necessarily wanted to leave Kidderminster", Simon told us, "We had some wonderful years there, but we just felt that it was time for us to move on and to hand over that church to somebody new. And so we began the process of looking for a new church with no idea where we would end up."

The Baptist system of moving on Ministers is a bit like a dating agency where churches that are looking for a new Minister are 'paired up' with potential ones. They meet together over several weekends and if they still like each other at the end of it all, a match is made!

"Catshill was the first place that we looked at", Simon revealed. "And, a bit like buying a house, it was obvious when we came here that this was going to be the place for us – even though it was just down the road! We love both the church, and the village life. It's similar to where both myself and Louise grew up in Leicestershire, and we knew that it would be a good place for the children to be too."

Simon is a keen Leicester City fan and has also been a football referee for the last 20 years both at a local and national level. Louise continues to travel back to Kidderminster each week where she is a Primary School teacher. They are both keen musicians and have been able to expand the existing group within the church each Sunday.

The Baptist Church is shortly to undergo some major changes here in the village which will mean them relocating their congregation to the Social Club later this Autumn. The old church hall, which is over 100 years old, is to be knocked down and rebuilt with a much more modern two-storey community building with two good sized meeting rooms, a larger hall, new kitchen facilities, along with more office and storage space. Naturally this is something Simon is excited about.

"My vision when I came here, was very much about raising the profile of the church within this community. We are much more than simply a gathering on a Sunday morning, and this new building will offer more scope for us to be part of the community and for the village to be connected to us too. Not only that, but maybe our move to the Social Club later this year will give the chance for people, who might be put off coming into a church building, to share with us in a different setting — who knows, maybe a Carol Service in the Social Club this year might just be your thing!"

Catshill Baptist Church has a gathering of around 150 people of all ages meeting each Sunday at 10.30am with separate activities provided for children and youth. Look out for their temporary relocation and new building beginning later this year.

As well as a quiz on Dahl's books, children were asked to put their dreams in jar so the Suzi could turn them into a story.
