
Senior Fellowship Group and I am extremely pleased to say that having received support from the Parish Council this group is now gaining in strength and numbers under the banner of the M & C Club.

Catshill Village Hall

OVER the past five years, Catshill Village Hall has been transformed from a suggestion of closure to an excellent community venue. The hall, which is a registered charity, is now self sufficient, after a complete refurbishment, which included a new kitchen, compliant with today's environmental and health and safety standards, up to date rest room for the less able bodied, new toilets and a meeting room. The main hall now boasts network facilities for IT training. The building also houses the Parish Council office.

There is a range of regular activities in the hall, from karate, card making, children's groups, big band practice, computer training, WI meetings, slimming classes, the Parish Council meetings, and a great deal more. Not withstanding this, it is *your* village hall. If you have any activities you would like to see included, please contact the Parish Clerk, who will forward them to the hall trustees. Although the hall is well used, it is still available to hire for private parties, so get in touch to use *your* village hall.

Bromsgrove and District Citizens Advice Bureau

THE Bromsgrove Citizens Advice Bureau based in Bromsgrove has never been busier and has seen a 14% increase in enquiries this year. The largest demands for our services are for debt, welfare benefits, housing, employment, relationship breakdown and tax credit enquiries. The financial stress being placed on people during this recession is causing families considerable hardship and much of our work relates to assisting people to regain control over their debts and finances and maximise their income by identifying benefits and tax credits. The bureau has recently secured funding through Bromsgrove District Council to fund an Owner Occupier Debt Adviser specifically to assist clients with mortgage difficulties to ensure where possible early help is available and the threat of repossession is avoided. We are also working with Bromsgrove Council on a number of Government initiatives such as Mortgage Rescue.

As many people from rural areas have difficulty in reaching advice centres, the bureau has introduced appointments in addition to the drop-in service and screening interviews to quickly identify the best method of helping people. Additionally we are increasing the availability of our telephone advice line in the afternoons. We also have a Specialist Housing Unit to advise on all aspects of housing enquiries.

Changes to Recycling and Garden Waste Collections

BROMSGROVE District Council is making improvements to the recycling and garden waste services in 2010

From April 2010 recyclable items will be collected from a green wheeled bin

From March 2010 garden waste will be collected from a brown wheeled bin

Household waste will continue to be collected from grey bins on alternate weeks to the recycling and garden waste.

You will be able to keep your old recycling boxes, but if you do not wish to keep them, you may drop them off at the Council Central Depot or call the CSC on **01527 881288** and arrange for them to be collected.

Garden Waste Customers

As green bins will be used for your recyclables, you will need to use a brown bin for garden waste. To receive your brown bin, apply for the 2010 garden waste service now and your bin will be delivered as soon as possible.

Can you help?

THE Parish Council consists of thirteen members drawn from the local community of Catshill and North Marlbrook, with 9 members representing Catshill Village ward, 2 members representing Barley Mow ward and 2 members representing North Marlbrook ward. The members are voted into office every four years, with the next election to be held in May 2011 alongside the District Council elections. Sometimes a casual vacancy will occur when, if there is no call for a by-election, the Parish Council can co-opt a member without the need for an election.

At the moment we are operating with only eleven members and the Parish Council would like the two vacant seats to be filled as soon as possible. The council meets at Catshill Village Hall on the last Thursday evening of each month except for August and December; committee meetings are also held on Thursday evenings.

Home Composting

GOOD news! The worst of the winter is over and spring is just around the corner. Now we can look forward to planning and working in our gardens after our period of inactivity in them. I wonder how many of you compost your dead plants, grass cuttings, leaves and vegetable matter. Well, now is the time to set up your very own composting bin. You do not need to buy a bin specifically for this purpose as it is possible to make your own out of reclaimed wood, which can be made of a size to suit your garden. Place the bin, on soil preferably, in a sunny position and begin to put into it your vegetable peelings, fruit peel, tea bags, coffee grounds (green matter), scrunched up newspaper, shredded paper, egg boxes (not plastic), egg shells (dried out in the oven on a baking tray the next time the oven is used and crumbled when dry) the inner rolls of foil, cling film, kitchen and toilet paper (brown matter). If you have a lot of grass cuttings in the summer, put a good layer into the bin and add some soil and scrunched up newspaper. This will help to avoid it becoming a soggy mess by soaking up the excess water. Keep layering the grass cuttings with any other brown matter you have to compost. As air plays an important role along with the worms, it is good if you can turn the composting material over to speed up the decomposition, which takes between 6 months to one year, depending on the outside temperatures. Other accelerants are comfrey leaves, nettles (minus the seed pods) and diluted human urine. Worms do not like the cold weather, so they work a lot slower in the winter and remember they do not have teeth, so keep your waste matter small. Whatever you do, do not add any cooked food or meat to your bin as this will encourage rats. If you do have any cooked food waste (which ideally you should not, as this creates methane gas when it is put into landfill sites) this should be treated in a Bokashi bin, to which the special bran added. After two weeks of treatment, it is then ready to be put into your compost bin, where it will continue to decompose. No compost bin should smell or encourage vermin. The end product is a good addition to any garden either as a fertiliser or mulch and after sieving can be used to germinate seeds and cuttings if mixed with potting compost. What better way is there to get something for nothing – a rare experience these days don't you agree? Worcestershire Walks

THERE'S no doubt about it, walking is good for you. It's good for your heart, lungs, muscle and bone growth of your children and for your feeling of wellbeing! Strong scientific evidence now supports the many benefits to health of regular walking – it is recommended that we take at least 10,000 steps a day. Studies show that walking can:

Reduce the risk of coronary heart disease and stroke

Lower blood pressure
Reduce high cholesterol
Reduce body fat

Enhance mental well being

Walking offers a great way to help children get the active habit. If parents express excitement about the prospect of a walk in the countryside, they are more likely to transmit this feeling to their children. It's important to treat the walk as an exploration or adventure and to go at the child's pace, no matter how often they want to stop and look at things. Take treats to eat and plenty to drink and head for some landmark that will appeal to them such as a castle, a playground, an ice cream van or a boating pond. If children experience walking as part of a fun activity they are more likely to want to go again. So, how do you find out what is on offer? John Harris, a keen walker, got fed up with the lack of information on walks that were going on in the County. So, he decided that if he couldn't find what he was looking for – he had better create it!
