Catshill Community Library Update

CATSHILL Library is moving from Barley Mow Lane to its new site at Catshill Middle School in Meadow Road. Here is a message from Steve Mobley, Manager for the County Council's Library and Learning Service.

"We continue to make excellent progress preparing for the move. Most important has been the fantastic support and enthusiasm from the initial wave of volunteers. We've been delighted to have met our volunteers individually to discuss opportunities for training and to experience library life in Catshill and Rubery libraries as we get closer to the move in April after Easter. All volunteers will have the opportunity to work alongside regular members of staff and can be reassured that Bev Orlowsky, a very experienced Library Manager, will work with volunteers to ensure we continue to provide good quality services to the community.

As we move closer to 16th April we would like to afford the community an opportunity to share any memories of the existing library building which was of course originally a chapel. In the library is a small display of some historic cuttings and a memories book where we hope current and former users of the building will pop in and record their memories. I for one remember my mother taking me to the library in the mid 60's and thumbing through the wooden box to find my library ticket. No computer systems then! This small piece of Catshill history can be taken with us to the new library and hopefully younger and future generations will recognise how this building has been very much at the heart of the Catshill community and that library services continue to be valued.

If you can't get to the library please email a well-wishing message to *Catshilllib@worcestershire.gov.uk* and we'll ensure they are recorded and displayed.

A Message from the Chair

WE start the year again with demands for more housing in the parish. The proposals to demolish the garage blocks off Byron Way to provide housing were turned down by district councillors due to the parking problems that would arise as a result. We now await the decisions regarding similar plans off Oak Road and the proposal to build 15 onebedroom flats to replace the Ivy Cottage public house. We know this will create parking problems in an area that is already congested and

residents are concerned about access to services and emergency vehicles. We understand the need for more housing generally but think the time must be coming when we say enough is enough for Catshill and North Marlbrook!

Flooding in Green Lane is still a worry even though some work has been carried out on the balancing pools and surrounding area to alleviate the problem. The North Worcestershire Water Management team are working towards



improving the situation so that residents will not have to venture out every time a heavy rain storm comes along ensuring sand bags are in place, which is not acceptable in this day and age.

The Catshill library is moving from Barley Mow Lane to refurbished space at the side of the Middle School. You can read more about this in the newsletter.

We are looking at the state of the bus shelters within the Parish which were put up

before the Parish Council was instated; we think some need to be replaced. We have installed two new shelters in the last few years, but even those are vandalised from time to time I am sorry to say. This year a band D council tax payer will contribute £10.40 to our funds* so we would like to hear your views on how the council's funding is spent. Should we replace the bus shelters or is there something else we should be investing in?

Due to undisclosed problems at Bromsgrove DC the government grant of £2530 we expected BDC to pass on to the parish councils has been left out of the precept calculations, meaning a band D council tax payer will be contributing £11.55 to the parish precept instead of the £10.40 we requested. At the time of going to press the parish council has not yet met to decide how to deal with this. We would welcome your suggestions.

The qualification is that you need to reside, work or own land in the Parish or live within three miles of the boundary. Having got the rules out of the way, what will you have to do?

Most councillors sit on a committee or two that looks in detail at Parish Council business, these can be broadly categorised as planning, environmental and events. Some of us concentrate on specific areas others take a wider view of Parish matters. For most councillors it is just a few hours each month but like

most public offices you can generally do as much work as you want.

All councillors are expected to attend the full Council meeting that takes place monthly except August and December.

First World War Commemoration

WHILST on the subject of Lord Kitchener, he had a glittering military and political career before dying in the middle of the First World War. As the Secretary of State for War, he was a powerful and influential individual. His iconic image was used to sign up the vast number of personnel needed to conduct the campaign.

Next year sees the hundred-year anniversary of the start of that war and many commemorations are planned. Nothing has yet been discussed at the Parish Council but some form of tribute will almost certainly be made to honour the men from this area who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

We have a Book of Remembrance (lodged at Christ Church, also online on the Parish website) that contains details of the men whose names are on the War Memorial. We are always interested to obtain more information about them, many of whose relatives and descendents we suspect still live in the area. Please contact the clerk if you have any material to offer.

As for a commemoration, that will be planned later in the year, suggestions as to what we could do would be appreciated

Through foodbanks, Christians are leading the way in combating hidden hunger in the UK, but there's so much more to be done.



Localism - One Member's View

ON taking office in 2010, David Cameron's big idea was "localism". In essence devolving decision-making down to localities and small communities. Unfortunately neither he nor his ministers have really explained very well what they mean by term let alone how it can be applied in practice.

To date much of the implementation of localism has been in rural areas where to be fair a number of initiatives have started mainly to get over the sticky issue of how expand the population to more sustainable levels without invoking opposition to more building.

Here in Catshill & North Marlbrook we are not rural but suburban with fairly easy access to most of what we want within a few miles. But that does not mean that we do not have problems that may well be solved by "localism" i.e. local people taking initiatives to enhance their community.

Without pre-empting the deliberations of the Parish Council where we shall be looking in depth at this matter in coming months, we could apply our own take on "localism" now by our own individual actions.

If we are to have a viable and vibrant community within the Parish area then we all need to contribute to it however small that action might be.

One policy the Parish Council attempts to promote is buying locally to support local shops and businesses wherever possible. So instead of travelling to the nearest shopping mall or buying online why not buy from local shops or attempt to reinvigorate Bromsgrove's High Street?

Similarly with supermarkets. With a bit of effort it is quite easy to buy weekly supplies from smaller shops often at competitive prices and comparable quality.

Then there are the local pubs, all of which have seen a downturn in trade recently. OK, the factors are complex but not long ago the pubs were the focus of community activity even if it was just a chat and drink with the neighbours. It seems to be a habit that we have got out of.

Surprisingly there are a number of social and sports clubs that operate in and around the Parish. Some are quite busy whilst others particularly those for youngsters struggle due to lack of adult volunteers. We all want our youngsters to be gainfully occupied but it is difficult unless us older folk give them a hand.

So that is my very personal view on localism and not necessarily that of the Parish Council but I hope it provokes a bit of thought or even debate. Feedback would be appreciated.

Boundary Changes

THE Boundary Commission is reviewing all of Bromsgrove district's ward boundaries as a result of a request from the district council to reduce the number of district councillors. It is likely this will result in 32 wards with one member in each. In order to do this new wards will be created to provide equal representation across the district and for our area they are recommending that Catshill is split in two, with the new wards to be called Catshill North and Catshill South. The Marlbrook part of the parish will remain in the district's Marlbrook ward. Our initial

consultation response asked for Catshill to remain as one whole ward with two members but the Commission decided against this. They have now revised their plans to include the Wildmoor part of Bournheath parish in Catshill North, and Bournheath village is to be included with Catshill South. This is a big change as this new proposal does not recognise the M5 as a natural boundary or recognise that Catshill has its own unique identity. Wild About Plants is funded by Natural England through Access to Nature, as part of the Big Lottery Fund's Changing Spaces programme. Are Parish Councils a Waste of Money?

RECENT front page headlines in the Bromsgrove Standard referred to the costs of Parish Councils giving the impression that they are funded by the District Council. We would like to make it clear that the Parish Councils' precept (the money raised via council tax) is paid for only by residents of the parish and does not come from the District Council's coffers. This ensures that the tier of local government that is closest to the people it serves is paid for by those people. For 2013/14 the total amount for the year for a band D council tax payer is £11.55; we had expected this to be reduced to £10.40 thanks to a grant from Central Government intended to benefit all parish councils nationally to offset the council tax benefit changes but, as at time of writing, Bromsgrove DC have yet to pass this on.

We have to hold a meeting every year for residents to gather and talk about parish issues. This is known as the Annual Parish Meeting and this year it has been rescheduled so that anyone who has concerns about the costs involved can come and tell us what they think.

If you have any comments at all – good or bad or indifferent - about this issue then we would like to hear from you. Please come along to have your say on what we do with your money; the meeting will be held at Catshill Village Hall on Thursday 25th April 2013 at 7.00pm. If you can't make it to the meeting then please write or e-mail the Parish Council with your thoughts on funding.

Bracken Grove Play Area

JUST to update everyone on the situation regarding the closure of one of Catshill's long-standing play areas. Last October the District Council, as the body responsible for this play area, installed locked gates across the entrance to the Bracken Grove play area. When asked what was going on they claimed they were closing it down due to antisocial behaviour on the site. The District Council added that since there are other play areas within walking distance then the Bracken Grove area would be sold off to neighbouring properties as garden space. Residents and the Parish Council were concerned not to have been advised of the plan to lose a well-used community amenity. We would be interested to hear what you think about this closure.

Great British Fish and Chip Supper - Friday 17th May

WANT to do something different? Want to raise money where you live or work? Want to eat Fish and Chips, while raising money for charity? Hold a fish and chip supper on Friday 17th May 2013 whilst raising awareness of spinal cord injury and supporting SIA's information and support services.

Since 2009 we have raised over £20,000 and it has become our flagship community fundraising event. We want to raise £10,000 from this event in 2013 we can provide more support to spinal cord injured people.

The money raised from the suppers will help the Spinal Injuries Association offer support to individuals who become paralysed and their families, from the moment a spinal injury occurs, and for the rest of their lives by providing services and publications which enable and encourage paralysed people to lead independent lives.

Every year in the UK over 1,000 people experience a spinal cord injury and there are an estimated 40,000 spinal cord injured people in the UK alone.

Be a part of something special and make a real difference to help spinal cord injured people gain access to the information and support they need to enable them to live full and independent lives."



Catshill Marshes

IN an attempt to prevent the destruction of the wildlife marshy area that is bordered by the M5, Stourbridge Road, Church Road and Wildmoor Lane a group of residents organised themselves into the Catshill Marshes Action Group and submitted an application to officially recognise the site as a Village Green. After a three-day hearing at County Hall in early December last year the Inspector's decision was made known on 11th March 2013 that the application was not successful.

The Parish Council values the strong effort put up by the action group to retain this natural area that has been used by many residents over the years for walking round and playing on and is disappointed by the outcome. However the site already has planning permission for 80 new homes and the plans also incorporate retention of a wetland feature and an open brook course which will be looked after by a management company.

We can expect building work to start on the site shortly and although we may not like the concreting over of our green and pleasant land we understand the need for new housing. We shall therefore be welcoming of the new residents when they move in to our community and wish them well in their new homes.
