Cop Cards


West Mercia Police has launched an exciting way to inform children about the work that the police force does in the area - collectable Cop Cards. There are 25 plaving cards for children aged 7-14 to collect, with each one showing pictures and a description of different policing roles throughout West Mercia. There is also one special Cop Card to find, which has a unique web address giving extra hidden content. The prize for 5 lucky winners is a day at police headquarters in Worcester, where they will meet police officers and have a behind-the-scenes look at the way the force works. The War Memorial

About six years ago, the Parish Council commissioned local resident Andrew Bate to research the names of the men on the War Memorial. Andrew was successful in finding out much information, surprisingly more about the men from the First Wold War. As a result of his efforts we now know the area in which they lived, their family at the time, with which regiment they served and when and where they died. We also uncovered several interesting stories of gallantry and valour. This information is now kept in a bound volume at Christ Church, Catshill, and can be viewed by contacting the vicarage (phone 01527 579619). A copy is also available at Catshill Library in Barley Mow Lane. However, our research is not complete and we believe it is possible that a number of their relatives still live in Catshill and Marlbrook. If so, we would be delighted to hear from you, particularly if you have any additional stories or information about your ancestor that you would be willing for us to add to the archive. Photographs too would be very much appreciated. Parish Council finances

The accounts have been balanced for another year and are currently lodged with the auditor. At their meeting in April the councillors approved the figures for the financial year ending 31/03/2010, as shown here in brief.

Income	
Precept (that's our portion of the council tax paid by nearly 2,000 households from within the parish)	£20,312
Other receipts, such as concurrent functions	£3,272
Expenditure Staff costs (administration officer and litter picker)	£7,626
Other payments such as environmental improvements, grant aid, new bus shelters etc.	£15,048

The precept for the current financial year 2010/11 is £21,327.

The Parish Council would like to find out how you, the residents of the parish, want future funds to be spent and we will be holding a 'Participatory Budgeting' event later in the year. For instance, if you know of an area of open space in the parish that needs attention or you may like to see a scheme set up to encourage across-community help for the less able, then please do get involved. Parish Council notices

The Parish Council meets at Catshill Village Hall on the last Thursday of each month except for August and December. The notice and agenda for each of these meetings is attached to the council's notice boards located at the Ivy Gardens in Golden Cross Lane and outside Tesco Express on the Old Birmingham Road.

You do not have to be a parish councillor to attend these meetings – they are all open to the public and you are invited to speak near the start of the meeting if you have a concern about any agenda item.

Throughout the course of the month other agendas will appear relating to Parish Council committee meetings which are also open to the public. The notice boards contain further information relating to the Parish Council such as the Publication Scheme ie those documents that are available for public inspection, and general information on councillors' allowances.

During the year there will be a notice to let you know the audit has been called and your rights regarding the Parish Council's accounts to ensure full public accountability and trust. Additionally all this information is also available on the Parish Council's website.

In case you do not know, the extent of the parish falls within the M5/M42 boundary from the Washingstocks island on the Stourbridge Road up to Catshill Garage, then eastwards to Lydiate Ash island and the south side of the Alvechurch Highway to the cross roads with Marlbrook Lane, the east sides of which lie in Lickey and Blackwell Parish. From there the parish is bordered by the Old Birmingham Road, Braces Lane and Birmingham Road (A38) as far south as the new Topaz building site.

The gentleman concerned was miles off course, but what intrigued me was how he began his conversation, *"excuse me do you belong around here?"* what he meant was, 'do you live around here?' and he did quickly correct himself. What he asked me did get me thinking, do I really belong here in Catshill? What an interesting question! Have you ever asked it of yourself?

Participatory Budgeting

At the annual Parish Council Meeting. Cllr Phil Baker gave a presentation about participatory budgeting. Well, what is participatory budgeting? Wikipedia defines it as this: "Participatory budgeting is a process of democratic deliberation and decision making in which ordinary residents decide how to allocate part of a municipal or public budget". As a result the Parish Council will involve residents in how best to spend a particular element of the budget, discuss and make proposals for spending in the future. It is generally believed that having a broader participation in budget setting will increase the interest in and accountability of public bodies, thereby showing that it is not just a consultation exercise, but having democracy in action. However, Participatory Budgeting is not a cure for problems of local democracy, poor public services and traditional representation such as elected councillors, as it operates alongside other processes. As an aside, Participatory Budgeting started life in Brazil about 30 years ago and many countries, especially in the third world, have implemented successful schemes. Canada has adopted its own progressive model.

Before the Parish Council discusses this matter further, we would like feedback on the following two questions:

- 1 What is the best method of consulting everybody on how a particular pot of money should be spent?
- An open meeting?
- Questionnaires to each household?
- Via technology email / Facebook?
- Or any other options?
- 2 What elements of the Parish Council budget should be delegated to parish residents rather than decided by the councillors?
- Recreation facilities?
- Environmental matters?
- Public events?
- Anything else?
