Eligible people include those who are over 60 years of age, living alone or as a couple with no family dependents, those registered with charitable bodies for lonely people and those who are immobile or disabled.

IT may have been a poor summer, but we hope you enjoyed the splash of colour provided by the various gardens maintained by your Parish Council.

WE are fortunate to have a number of children's playgrounds around the village and up in Marlbrook. All are in good condition and as a result of regular attendance are clean and tidy.

All being well we should still have a few warm and dry days left this year to take advantage of facilities that are often under used. So here is quick guide to what we have available:

#### **Shelley Close**

Go to the end of Milton Road then down the cycle path for about 100m

It has a large slide, circular swing, aerial ropeway, walkway, mini merry-go-round. Also available is an enclosed space for football and basketball.





#### The Meadow

The entrance is opposite Catshill Middle School, playground is on the left side just past the pavilion.

There are swings, slide, climbing frame, monkey bar. Also plenty of space for kicking ball about and a path for small bikes.

#### **Lingfield Close**

You can find it just off the pathway that runs between Golden Cross Lane and Aintree Close Swings, climbing frame, slide, merry-go-round, dish. Also a field for running around are all available





#### **Braces Lane**

It is on the far side to the left of the football pitch.

There are swings, dish, walkway with a slide, rope climbing frame.

There are also play facilities at the Crown Inn and the Plough & Harrow. The playground on Bracken Grove was unfortunately closed by the District Council a few years ago

### Parish Defibrillators

**YOU** may recall in the last issue of the newsletter we advertised the installation of a defibrillator at the Meadow Pavilion. At the time the Council were in a period known as 'Purdah' due to the elections and some newsletter content was restricted due to this. We would now like to take the opportunity to thank Cllr. Shirley Webb for organising and funding the installation of the defibrillator at this site. In addition, Cllr Webb intends to oversee the installation of a further unit at the Baptist Church once the building work is complete.

Following a request from residents, the Parish Council is funding the installation of a third defibrillator at the Village Hall which will hopefully be in place before the end of the year.

# Neighbourhood Watch

**NEIGHBOURHOOD** Watch is a volunteer based scheme that is separate from the Police but can still be supported by them. West Mercia Police state 'It encourages communities to work together to protect themselves and their property which in turn



can help to prevent crime and reduce the fear of crime'. Anyone can be a Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator and can cover anything from a few houses to a few streets. Becoming a Coordinator and registering with the Neighbourhood Watch Network (National), West Mercia Neighbourhood Watch (Local) and the local policing team gives access to a wealth of information including crime alerts and crime reduction advice. A co-ordinator will be invited to National and Local Meetings, can hold their own meetings and can be trained in running a Facebook Account which will then allow the Police to contribute to the page too.

If you are interested in finding out more or becoming a coordinator for your area, please contact the Clerk using the details on the back of this newsletter.

Additionally, there is a large amount of information and support already at your disposal through www.westmercia.police.uk/crime-and-safety This includes a service called 'Community Messaging Service (CMS)' which is available for anyone to register with and this will send you information about crime in your area.

#### Motorways and Roads Around the Area

**FOR** a couple of years up to 2015 we had to endure considerable delays through the Parish owing to improvements at Junction 4. Then once this work was complete the stretch between Junctions 4a and 6 of the M5 was upgraded to a smart motorway resulting in massive amounts of traffic using the A38 and surrounding roads particularly at night-time. The objective of both schemes to speed up traffic flows.

We now have to endure more disruption as a result of the work being done between Junctions 1 and 2. This work is necessary maintenance and will take until Spring 2019 to complete.

Two councillors from the Parish Council recently attended a seminar run by Highways England, who are the managers of the repairs, to gain more information.

We did raise a number of points with them in particular:

- That the restrictions at Junction 4a (part of which is in our Parish area) would cause unnecessary delays
- That work on the M6 at Gravelly Hill (Spaghetti junction) ought to be done at a different time to reduce disruption

The delays at Junction 4a are proving to be worse than expected. There is likely to be increased traffic on the A38 during this time. However, the County Council will be imposing a 40 mph speed restriction on the stretch between Lydiate Ash and the Junction of Halesowen Road and Birmingham Road. That will be welcome for some residents but it remains to be seen if it has any impact on traffic volumes.

In addition, Virgin Media are causing a lot of disruption in the area whilst they lay fibre optic cables (in most cases in parallel with those for BT) in pavements and across roads.

Once the work on the M5 is complete then future projects within the West Midlands include making the M6 around Coventry into a smart motorway and a vast number of schemes to support the building of HS2 but that will be mainly on the eastern side of the region.

We are hoping to rectify this by the removal of the tree stump from the edge of the Garden to allow for regrading of the soil, and the addition of plants along the edges to assist with holding back the soil into the garden area. We are hoping these plants will embed well and ease the problem, making the garden aesthetically pleasing once more.

The Parish Council have again this year made a donation of £600 to the Bromsgrove and Redditch Citizens Advice Bureau which is a facility that is available to all.

# Sandbag Store



**IN** each edition of the newsletter, with the help of readers, I like to bring you a photograph of people and places from our past. This time we turn the spotlight onto The Catshill Male Voice Choir, who started off as The Gospel Union Singers in 1946, with their home being their chapel in Church Lane, Catshill.

The founding members were the five Wilkes brothers: Arthur, Bert, Jess, Jim and William, along with two of their cousins from the Ince family; Frank and George.

The Choir raised money for many charities, societies and hospitals by singing at various local venues, sometimes performing as many as three concerts per week!

For many years the choir practiced weekly in the Catshill Infants School Hall, and they were Catshill based for 20 years, before it was decided to move the choir to Bromsgrove. Sadly the troupe folded within two years of this move.

We are grateful to Mrs Thelma Jones for supplying information and this photo that shows the choir at the Catshill Music Festival in 1954 or 1956, where they came second in the competition.

If you have an old photograph of interest that you would like to share in a future edition, then please let us know, and remember that previous editions of this newsletter which contain other historical photographs are available on our web site.

**ONCE** again we are delighted to share a photograph taken by the late Dr R. A. F. Jack, which has been supplied by Martin Wells. It shows the row of cottages known as Parrys Row.



As can be seen these cottages used to be where Golden Cross Lane meets Gibb Lane by the Ivy Cottage pub, which is now the Co-Op. A number of Councillors, Officers and Members of the Neighbourhood Plan Working Party checked out the path that runs from behind the Crown Inn on Stourbridge Road, across the fields to the Birmingham Road. We then returned via the steep steps next to the bus shelter in Marlbrook, across the playing field on Lingfield Walk and using the various footpaths, back to the Crown Inn, where the evening's activities could be discussed and analysed. No blockages were found and apart from a few nettles all paths were easily



Safer Roads Partnership, Mr David Rischmiller from the North Worcestershire Community Safety Partnership and two officers from the Safer Neighbourhood Team were also in attendance.

Mr Perridge answered questions about parking on footpaths and speeding, and Mr

Rischmiller gave a useful talk on crime prevention. However, the biggest concern raised by residents was that of speeding vehicles, especially at off-peak times and evenings. With this in mind Cllr Webb has agreed with the Safer Neighbourhood team to arrange some speed monitoring sessions throughout the area.

# Neighbourhood Plan

**WORK** on the Neighbourhood Plan is progressing well. Over the past few months we focused on the Level One questionnaire phase. Our target was to have at least 250 questionnaires completed.

In addition to including copies of the questionnaire in the Spring edition of the Parish Newsletter we also held two workshops at Catshill Village Hall on the 13th May and 24th June. Members of the local community were able to meet representatives of the three

Neighbourhood Plan Working Groups and view displays covering Housing, Infrastructure and Environment. There was also an opportunity for people to complete a questionnaire at the workshops. We also hand delivered flyers and questionnaires to every address in the parish.

We have now completed the Level One Questionnaire phase. A detailed analysis of the results of the submitted questionnaires has now been done and these results will inform the work of the three working groups who are currently undertaking further research.

In due course a more comprehensive Level 2 questionnaire will be compiled and this will be circulated to every household and business in the Neighbourhood Plan area".

### Superfast broadband arrives in your area

As part of the Superfast Worcestershire Broadband Programme, a number of broadband street cabinets have been upgraded to superfast fibre broadband and are now live and ready to take orders in your parish.

Cabinets which are not yet live soon will be – details are given below. Please bear in mind that there may also be other cabinets planned for your area in the coming months. We will regularly update your community with any future works.

This means that more residents and businesses in the parish will be able to request an upgrade to fibre-enabled broadband from a range of Internet Service Providers (ISPs).

In most cases, this means that residents can select a broadband service offering download speeds above 24Mb/s following infrastructure upgrades made via the Superfast Worcestershire Broadband Programme.

Superfast Worcestershire is funded by Worcestershire County Council, Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK), BT and the Worcestershire Local Enterprise Partnership through the Government's Growth Deal to provide access to fibre-enabled broadband where this is not commercially viable without public sector investment.

#### How to upgrade to superfast broadband

Please note that improved broadband services are not turned on automatically. To upgrade superfast broadband, please contact your chosen ISP or use comparison sites to find available packages. One of the comparison websites is:

If you contact your choice of ISP, please state that you wish to order 'fibre-enabled / superfast broadband,' otherwise they may offer you a slower broadband service. Your chosen ISP should be able to offer any technical assistance to access fibre-enabled / superfast broadband.

#### What to expect

It is important to note that not all premises within a postcode area will necessarily be able to order superfast speeds (above 24Mb/s). Premises will be able to access a range of speeds - some will get superfast broadband and others will be able to get anywhere between 2Mb/s and 24Mb/s, depending on their distance from the cabinet.

There may also be other cabinets in your area that have yet to be planned, have recently become live or have been installed by BT Openreach as part of its commercial deployment. Please check the following website to see up-to-date details for any postcodes in your area:
