The reader quite rightly suggested that to do this, we would need a team of volunteers to help us organise and plan, including choosing bands, arranging catering and ticketing etc.


If any readers are interested in helping, then we would love to hear from you. You don't need any experience, just be enthusiastic and willing to help to make a community event in our own back yard.

## Chairman's Chatter



**WELCOME** to another news magazine and many thanks for the kind remarks we have received in relation to our previous issues.

I have been receiving mixed opinions about the heat wave we are experiencing currently, some are actually still enjoying it but the vast majority are now practising the rain dance.

I must compliment Councillor Malcolm Shepheard on the hard work he is putting into keeping the Ivy Cottage Garden looking fresh and remind myself to check into the use of the parks stand pipe should we experience a hose pipe ban.

You will all have received a letter from myself along with a questionnaire relating to the Neighbourhood Plan, that we would dearly like you to complete. We require a reasonable amount returning to take any bias out of the statistical analysis used to produce an end result. At the time of writing, there are still a few weeks remaining of July, so if you are able, and it is not in the bin, please take a little time to complete and return it before 31st July. Make your views count!

There have been some comments across Social Media sites relating to this questionnaire, many of them positive and supportive, which we thank you for. However, it may be worth reminding Parishioners that Parish Councillors carry out their role purely voluntarily, receiving no payment for the work they undertake. We are also committed to ensuring the precept collected from Parishioners is used thriftily for the Parish and any large amounts of expenditure relating to the Neighbourhood Plan have been obtained through grants available for that purpose.

Your Council along with the Village Hall Committee and local District and County Councillor are arranging a number of events programmed for the Autumn and Winter months. These will include a Bonfire Night, Halloween Party, Armistice ceremony at our cenotaph with a service and refreshments at the Catshill Community Club, a turning on of the Christmas lights ceremony with street dancing and a choir and, of course, the ever popular Christmas Party for our Senior citizens. We are also looking at re-establishing the Music festival as well as running a re-enactment day to commemorate the ending of the First World war 100 years ago, and a lot of other ideas are being discussed.

The main problem that is brought to my attention is the speed of the vehicles using our village as a route onto or from the motorways. This is one that I am in total agreement with and can assure you we are doing everything we are able to mitigate it. Living on Golden Cross Lane and with windows open at night the noise of very fast traffic seems to go on continuously throughout the night. The flashing 30mph sign opposite the Methodist Church is totally ignored; you do not often see a brake light go on. This is repeated on the main arteries throughout the village. It is outside of the direct control of your Parish Council but we are lobbying on your behalf and working with the District and County Council, Safer Roads Partnership and Safer Neighbourhood Team.

# Speed Awareness Initiative

# SPEED.

This is one of the main issues that is often communicated with the Parish Council and is also, unfortunately, something we have little power to deal with. However, the Parish Council have decided to begin working on a speed awareness initiative. This will hopefully include:

- Training for and the introduction of a Community Speed Watch programme
- Application for a 20mph speed limit along Meadow Road and up to the Co-op area on Gibb Lane
- Trial of 30mph wheelie bin stickers on Barley Mow Lane initially
- The purchase of a mobile Vehicle Activated Speed sign for use around the Parish
- Identification of areas where more signage, repeater signs or road markings are needed

These things will take time to organise and co-ordinate and we will be working closely with Worcester County Council, Bromsgrove District Council, Highways Department and the Safer Neighbourhood Team in order to progress this initiative.



### 30mph Wheely Bin Sticker Signs

The Parish Council are aware that speeding is an issue throughout the whole Parish. Recently speed monitoring has been carried out by the Safer Roads Partnership and the police on certain roads Partnership and the police on certain roads which is set to continue. There are certain roads that we receive the most contact about and Barley Mow Lane is one of these. We have therefore decided to trial Wheely Bin Speed Stickers on this road. If this is deemed successful, more roads may also have stickers distributed to them.

Those of you who live on Barley Mow Lane will have received two wheely bin stickers in this magazine, one for each of your bins. Please attach it to the side of your wheely bin that faces towards the top of Barley Mow Lane (towards A38) when it is out on the pavement. This should create the effect of a temporary repeater sign for traffic coming down the road on bin collection days. Please

continue to collect your bins as soon as possible after emptying to prevent undue obstacles on the pavements.

## From Our Past



**IN** this edition of our News Magazine I am delighted to bring you an old photograph of Cunny Green Pond. It was supplied courtesy of Grenville Giles of The Dock, Catshill, who tells me that the title of the photograph is '*Mrs. Price at Cunny Green*.'

I am informed that this photograph dates back to the 1950s, though it may be earlier.

My own mother, Mrs. Hazel Masters remembers this pond from the 1930s when she was a young girl. She has memories of villagers "skating" on it when it froze during the winter.

Cunny Green Pond was in Barnsley Hall fields (behind the cemetery), and almost certainly got its name from "Coney" which is pronounced cunny, and is an old word for rabbit. The pond no longer exists, and I am not sure whether it dried up naturally, or was intentionally drained. If you know more then please let us know!

### Catshill Village Hall

The Village Hall continues to be a useful focal point for the community. We are making improvements and constantly keeping the Hall in good repair. Internally, each of the strip lights is being replaced with LED lights, both toilets have been



renovated and improved, the flooring in the main hall has been re-enforced to prevent lifting and CCTV has been fitted both internally and externally. More recently, externally, we have laid a patio under the canopy and have been provided with rose bushes in pots by Meadows School to make the entrance more welcoming. The weeds, foliage and trees around the hall have been a huge project. The vegetation was damaging the walls, roof and guttering of the Hall and inhibiting the use of the car park. This is being

tackled in stages – the trees have been removed from the rear of the hall leaving a brighter aspect through the window of the Hall whilst preventing the damage they were causing; the foliage and vegetation has been stripped from the perimeter of the Hall and a cycle of weed killer and strimming is being used to reduce the weed growth in the car park and at the front of the Hall. We will keep you updated with the progress.

There are numerous activities to suit all age groups and interests held onsite - please look at our brand new website (*http://catshillvillagehall.co.uk/*). We have a few spare slots for weekly activities and of course we are well used for events which cover a wide variety of parties, meetings etc. Upcoming events for the Autumn include a Table Top Sale with some rather classy items and in October there will be a Children's Halloween Party again, following

**THE** Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group continues to work tirelessly to progress this project. Much time and effort was taken in designing and producing the questionnaires that were distributed via Royal Mail to each household in Catshill and North Marlbrook. This was funded by a grant provided by Groundwork Ltd, specifically designed to assist groups with the completion of Neighbourhood Plans. This phase 2 questionnaire was directly influenced by the previous responses received during consultations carried out with businesses and residents during 2017. At the time of writing this article in excess of 300 responses have been received and the team are now working hard to input these replies so that the next phase of the project can be implemented. This will involve creating a draft report which will be consulted on later in the year, and will feed into the final Neighbourhood Plan document. Thank you for your continued support in creating a document that is important in safeguarding our semi-rural community.
