HELLO everybody this month's contribution concerns speeding motorists in the Catshill District and how we are hopefully going to tackle the problems and try to reduce speeding within our area and make people aware that speeding is not acceptable and that the District and Parish Council's take these issues very seriously.

- **1.** A new initiative undertaken by the Parish Council and working closely with the Community Policing Team is to create a **Community Speed Watch Group** which has now been initially set up and is called Catshill SWG. This can be found at the following website. https://www.communityspeedwatch.org.
- **2.** As with all new initiatives we want you to volunteer to become a Speedwatch Member and this is imperative for the group to be successful.
- **3.** There will be both online training to undertake and once this has been completed further training will be provided by the local police before you can become a full member of the team.
- **4.** All speeding motorists will receive a letter from the police and repeat offenders will be visited by the police.

- **5.** Some of our speed signs within Catshill are currently faulty and they will be replaced with newer up to date signs in due course. I am currently undertaking research on both the cost and durability of their replacements.
- **6.** Other speed reduction options, such as traffic calming measures, will require evidence-based facts before we can proceed. We are also looking at a range of other potential options such as repeater speed signs etc at identified speed hotspots.
- **7.** I am currently undertaking a speeding sign survey to identify where further speed signs could be positioned, to raise awareness with motorists that they are driving in a reduced speed area.

Neighbourhood Plan Update

FOLLOWING on from the update given in our Spring 2021 parish news magazine, the statutory Regulation 16, six-week representation period, which ran from the 25th February 2021 to 8th April 2021, has now been concluded by Bromsgrove District Council.

An examiner was subsequently appointed to carry out an independent examination of the Neighbourhood Plan and his final report has now been received.

The examiner has recommended the Neighbourhood Plan, with some modifications, goes to referendum. Therefore the local referendum on the Neighbourhood Plan will be held later this year, subject to the approval of Bromsgrove District Council.

AS I write this article at the beginning of June, it appears that we have finally seen the end of Winter and now Summer has arrived. Spring seems to have given us a miss this year. We have also gone from experiencing the driest April on record, to probably one of the wettest May's on record. I suppose this is most likely linked to the impact of Global Warming. Let's hope we have some decent summer weather, as many of us will be considering staycations this year, rather than risk travelling abroad, as we slowly navigate our lives out of this horrid Covid-19 nightmare.

In April we were sad to hear of the death of Prince Philip. We posted a tribute message marking his death, on the

Parish Council website and we arranged for the Union Flag to be flown at half-mast on Catshill Village Hall. In non-Covid times we would hopefully have been able to do more, to allow local people to pay their own respects to the late prince.

Some of you will have noticed that work was recently undertaken to completely redesign our Remembrance Garden, which is located at The Dock, adjacent to Catshill Baptist Church. The garden had become a bit of an eyesore in recent times. Thanks to the leadership of Councillor Ian Hooper, chair of the Parish Council Environment & Highways Committee, a few local councillors undertook work to completely revamp the garden, which has included removing the wooden surrounding fence, and creating a pathway through the middle of the garden and erecting a memorial stone. We will be planting additional shrubs at the garden in due course.

Unfortunately, one of our other parish gardens, the Ivy Cottage Garden, situated on Golden Cross lane, near to the junction with Green lane, has recently been targeted by vandals. They removed some flowers and scattered them onto the nearby ground. The local police have been notified. We have arranged for the summer plantation to be done very soon. Hopefully these new flowers will not be targeted by vandals.

One of our councillors Jill Bate, has recently decided to resign from the Parish Council, mainly for health reasons. I would like to thank Jill for her public service and wish Jill and her husband Andrew, a happy retirement.

We now have a few vacancies for Parish Councillors, and it would be great if some local residents would consider volunteering to fill these vacancies.

The main role of a Parish Councillor is to represent the views of all residents within the Parish and to listen to, and understand, the views and needs of different groups in the community. THERE are many public rights of way in and around our parish which can be used by the public at all times. These rights of way can be on privately owned land and it is an offence to block them without "lawful authority or excuse". You can take a pushchair or wheelchair if the path is suitable but you will need to take into account that the surface may be uneven, waterlogged or muddy and there may be stiles and gates. You can take photographs or have a small picnic but remember to take your litter home. You can also take your dog but they must be kept under control particularly if near livestock. Be careful not to stray off the footpath as you may be committing trespass and that includes your dog!



Catshill Parish has its own footpath warden, responsible for monitoring our footpath and that includes reporting issues such as flooding or blockages and maintaining "waymarks" like the ones below.


Ordnance Survey (OS) maps are the easiest way of finding out rights of way and the Explorer series (1:25,000 scale) is the most useful for walkers. Public rights of way are shown in green and permissive paths are

orange. Catshill and North Marlbrook is covered by map 219 (Wolverhampton and Dudley) but you will also need map 220 if you want to cover East of Barnt Green and 204 if you want to cover South of Bromsgrove. You may prefer to buy a custom map that is centred on your house so that Catshill is right in the middle! More details from <code>www.shop.ordnancesurvey.co.uk/custom-made</code>. An alternative is to install the OS app on your mobile device.

You can find more information and view our local footpaths on an interactive map by going to www.worcestershire.gov.uk/info/20237/public_rights_of_way. As well as the map there is facility for you to report a footpath issue.

There are four types of public right of way in England and Wales. In addition there

are also permissive rights of way which a landowner have given permission for people to walk or ride. The permission may just be for walkers and may be withdrawn by the landowner at any time.



There is an informal footpath group made up of Parish Councillors and the footpath warden. We hope you are inspired to make use of and enjoy local footpaths and please report any issues using the link above.

MANY of you may be aware, from coverage in the local press and social media, that the Parish Council recently experienced problems with our Precept for the financial period 2021-22. The precept is the Parish Council's share of the council tax. The precept demand goes to the billing authority, Bromsgrove District Council (BDC), who collect the tax for the Parish Council

The Parish Council set an increase of 2.23% for that period, but due to an unfortunate error in the forms submitted to BDC, it was wrongly stated that we were seeking a 37% increase.

We only became aware of this mistake close to the date when BDC send out the Council Tax demands. The chair of the Parish Council Finance and Staffing Committee and myself, held urgent talks with the BDC Financial Support Manager and their Head of Finance and Customer Services, in an effort to get the council tax bills amended, to reflect our actual request for a 2.23% precept increase. We were advised, that as the bills were already printed and ready for posting, it would cost the Parish Council \$35,000 to have the bills reprinted. It was simply not feasible for us to sustain that cost, which would have vastly exceeded the extra revenue which the precept error had generated. Reluctantly, we had no choice but to allow the tax bills to be sent out, unamended.

The precept error means that an extra £19,000 will now be collected from local residents, during this financial year. This works out at an average household paying an extra £8 for the whole year. It is our intention that this £19,000 will be spent on behalf of our residents, over the next 12 months.

We invite you to submit suggestions to our parish clerk, telling us what you would like us to consider spending this money on. We have already received some suggestions, as follows:

- 1). Pelican crossing in front of the Methodist church on Golden Cross Lane
- 2). Business Fair on the meadow.
- 3). Arts Festival
- 4). Trees planted in memory of all the residents who have lost their lives during the pandemic.
- 5). Park benches, at a number of named locations.

We look forward to receiving many suggestions from you.

IF you live, walk or drive through Catshill, you may well have caught site of a miniature horse grazing on the various grassy areas within the village.

The horse is actually called Kilcummer Pluto, but is better known as "*Peanut*", and his owner is Patrick Smith REMT-P, Dip E & PHC, Dip SMT.

Patrick is a professional and highly motivated tutor, with 40 years experience working in various health care settings. He runs a business called PS Training, offering a large range of health and Social Care courses. But how did Peanut come to join Patrick's business?

Patrick had been in the Army, and had witnessed many things that most

civilians will never witness; so much so that on leaving after 22 years service, he was suffering from PTSD.

Five years ago, on watching a documentary about animals as therapy to help with different mental health conditions including "Therapy Horses" and how they can help on the road to recovery, he bought Peanut. Much to Patricks delight, Peanut did indeed help with his mental health, and along with regular sessions from Combat Stress he started to feel better.

Patrick then realised that he could use Peanut to help others with problems, and made him available to visit schools, hospitals, Care homes and private premises to assist with the relief of anger, anxiety, autism, low self confidence and trauma etc.

Peanut, who is fully house trained, now spends 70-80% of his time inside Patrick's home in Cobnall Road, where he is free to wander in and out as he pleases.


